LIVERY STABLE

Historically, a livery stable was a place where horses, teams, buggies and wagons were for hire. Often attached to a hotel or boarding house, horses could be boarded for a short time. It was a time when people depended on horses for their daily provisions and for getting around, City horses had to be fed, and there was big business in supplying oats, barley, hay, and straw, with provisioners as common as gas stations are today.



The current Livery Building was constructed in the 1950s to protect artifacts of early transportation, agriculture and rural items of the area that were donated to the museum. The building is now in disrepair and does not provide visitor access nor adequate protection for the current collection, other exhibits in storage, blacksmithing tools and other historic equipment because of scarce space.

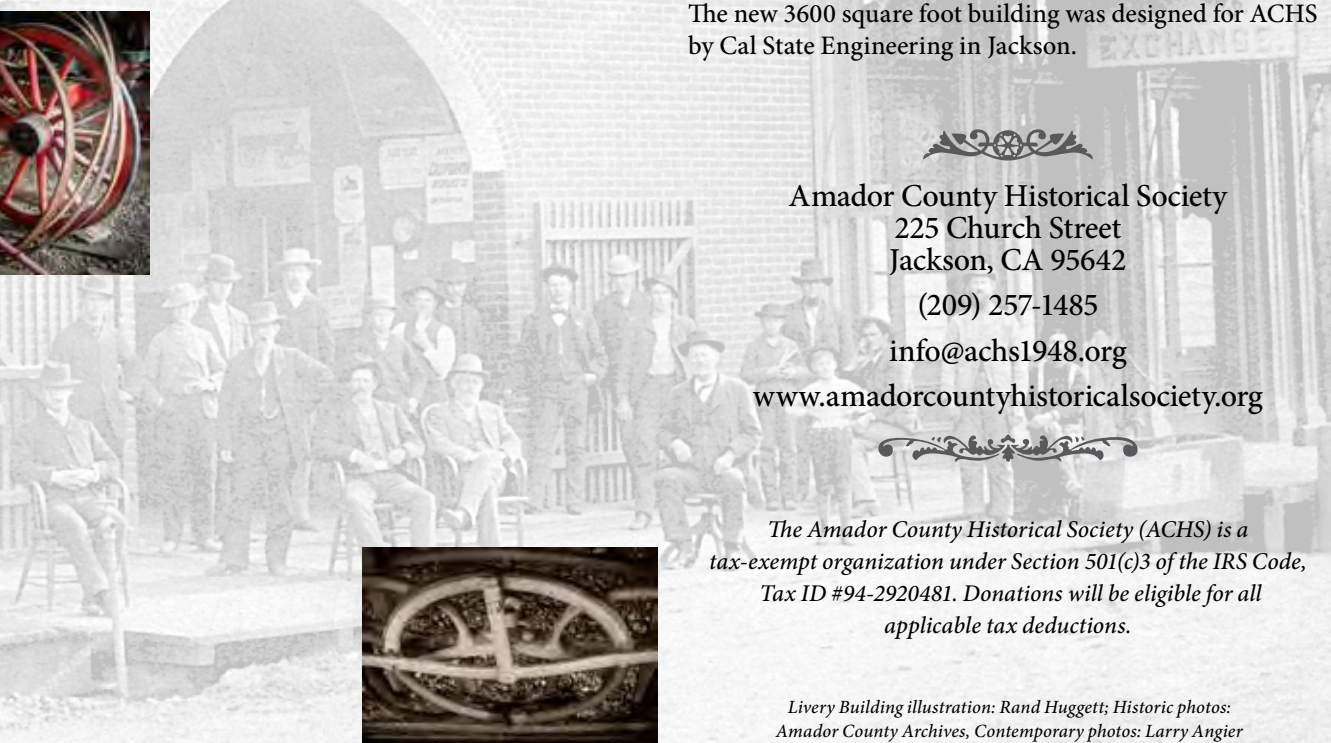


ACHS—Preserving History in the New Livery Building

This new Livery building will provide a home to the existing collection, and add to the preservation of future acquisitions in telling of the fascinating history of the Amador County and the Mother Lode. The design and construction of the Livery is a California-style barn with a cupola running the length of the building, compatible with the rural architecture of existing buildings.



The new 3600 square foot building was designed for ACHS by Cal State Engineering in Jackson.
